




Hardin, M. <u>Hero Dad</u>. Beginning with the statement "My dad is a superhero," a young boy shares information about activities engaged in by his father, an American soldier stationed in what looks to be the Middle East. The boy's simple narration and the pencil-and-watercolor illustrations make it clear that the superhero status doesn't come from a fantasy (e.g., flying through the air, X-ray vision) but from the very real actions soldiers perform daily in the course of duty: driving a tank, jumping out of an airplane, and so on. Hardin's first-person narrative helps make the difficult subject matter approachable for young children faced with separation from military and reassuringly, this dad comes home. j PAR PIC Hardin



Hardin, M. <u>Hero Mom</u>. A tribute to moms who serve their country in the military. The moms in the book are superheroes. They may not leap over tall buildings, and they may not have super-human speed. But these moms construct buildings, fly planes, and make tanks roll.
